

Pupil Premium Report for the Academic Year 2019/20

Funding

In 2019/20 Guiseley School received a Pupil Premium grant of £181,736

Purpose of Funding (DFE, 2014)

The Pupil Premium Grant (PPG) is additional funding given to publicly funded schools in England and is paid under Section 14 of the Education Act 2002 and, in accordance with Section 16 of that Act. The purpose of the grant is to provide funding for two policies:

- raising the attainment of disadvantaged pupils of all abilities to reach their potential
- supporting children and young people with parents in the regular armed forces

Basis of Funding

In the 2019/20 academic year, Guiseley School received the following funding for:

Pupils in years 7 to 11 recorded as Ever 6 Free School Meals. This includes pupils recorded in the January 2018 school census who are known to have been eligible for FSM since May 2012, as well as those first known to be eligible at January 2018.	£935 for pupils in year 7 to year 11

Use of Pupil Premium Funding during 2019/20 at Guiseley School

At Guiseley School and across schools nationally, the period from mid-March 202 until the end of the academic year has been dominated by the outbreak of COVID-19.

The much reduced opening of all schools in March, followed by the period of widening opening of schools from 15th June has had a profound impact on the ability to implement the actions and strategies outlined in our current pupil premium strategy and planned expenditure.

Consequently, it has not been possible to implement and evaluate all planned strategies, with plans being amended and provisions adapted to support out most disadvantaged pupils and families.

We have continued to address the challenges faced by pupils who experience social disadvantage. Guiseley School has put in place the following measure to support all disadvantaged students:

- 1) Percentage of salary for an Assistant Headteacher to lead Pupil Premium strategies across the school
- 2) Dedicated attendance officer
- 3) Percentage of salaries for SENDCo, Pastoral Leaders, Assistant Pastoral Leaders and Behaviour support workers to support pupils in improving attendance and behaviour
- 4) Cost of Barrington Stokes reading books for use in 1:1 reading mentoring
- 5) Offsite provision costs per student
- 6) Subsidised music lessons
- 7) Subsidised trips/visits
- 8) 1:1 tuition
- 9) To support the provision of materials and stationery for use at home, including specific art materials for those students studying this subject at GCSE level
- 10) Support independent work at home during COVID-19 lockdown by providing laptops
- 11) Revision guides and set texts
- 12) Uniform
- 13) Transport

The evidence-informed approach we adopt at Guiseley School is rooted in tackling educational disadvantage in the classroom. This is a long-term approach; it may well be necessary and desirable for leaders to continue many 2019/20 planned actions into the 2020-21 academic year and beyond. This is in line with EEF guidance on 'Putting Evidence to Work – A School's Guide to Implementation.' Planned activities and strategies need to be implemented effectively, over time. They need to be robustly evaluated and embedded to create sustainably positive outcomes for disadvantaged learners.
